



<p><b>Source</b></p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1) When was the image created?</li><li>2) Who created the image?</li><li>3) What kind of visual image is it?</li><li>4) For what audience was the image created?</li><li>5) What's the significance of these pieces of information?</li></ol>
<p><b>Observe</b></p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1) List everything you see in the image – people, animals, plants, celestial bodies, mythical creatures, structures, objects, etc.</li><li>2) What evidence in the image helps you understand why it was created?</li></ol>
<p><b>Contextualize</b> (using your own prior knowledge)</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1) List the things the image tells you about life at the time it was created</li><li>2) Do you know of other events, people, and places from this era? List them</li><li>3) How do these pieces of information help you understand the perspectives in this image, why it was created, and its significance to our understanding of this time and place?</li></ol>
<p><b>Corroborate</b> (by formulating questions)</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1) What questions do you have that would help you understand this image further?</li><li>2) What evidence (primary or secondary) would help you answer your questions? Where would you go next?</li></ol>
