

# Vocabulary List

City	A group of people who live in a particular place, or share a common interest. A few examples: city neighborhoods, small towns, faith communities (Christian, Islamic, Hindu, etc.), college communities.				
Community	A large community of twenty thousand or more residents.				
Forest	A thick growth of trees and other vegetation covering a large piece of land.				
History	A story of past events.				
Location	The place where something is or will be.				
Mountain	a part of the earth's surface that rises high above the surrounding area.				
Native	A person whose ancestors were the original inhabitants of a place or region, such as Native Americans. A person is also said to be "native" to the place in which they were born, i.e., a person born in Iowa is called an Iowa native.				
Primary Source	A first person or eyewitness account, an original artifact, document, speech, or picture of an event.				
Railroad	A track of parallel steel rails along which trains run.				
River	A large natural stream flowing into an ocean, a lake or another large stream				
Settle	To make a permanent home or live in.				
Town	A community of houses, stores, and other buildings. It is larger than a village but smaller than a city.				
Trade	The act of giving one thing for another; an exchange.				
Transportation	The act of carrying something from one place to another.

# Increasing Literacy through History Learning

#### Activity 1: Long, Long Ago – Native Americans Lived Here First

#### **Literacy Activities in the Lesson:**

1. Teacher models determining importance while reading **Right Here on This Spot**.

### **Activity 2: Non-Native Settlers**

#### **Literacy Activities in the Lesson:**

- Vocabulary development: focus on terms in <u>Aurora Means Dawn</u> (oxen, perish, surveyor, glinted, settlers, etc.).
- 2. Teacher models <u>questioning</u> while reading aloud <u>Aurora Means Dawn</u>.

## **Activity 3: Building a Town**

#### **Literacy Activities in the Lesson:**

- Teacher models <u>strategies good readers use before, during, and after</u> reading, while s/he reads aloud <u>Since 1920</u>. Strategies include:
- accessing prior knowledge
- setting a purpose for reading
- predicting and changing predictions based on new information
- making analogies
- summarizing

## **Activity 4: Your Community Long Ago and Today**

#### **Literacy Activities in the Lesson:**

- 1. Vocabulary knowledge: Focus on "community" while reading **On the Town**.
- 2. <u>Analogies</u>: Students draw parallels between the local community long ago and today.



# Literacy Activities incorporated by BHH pilot teachers, in addition to those in the original BHH lesson.

Students read books on community places and community people. This increases fluency and student perceptions of reading as an activity that is personally relevant.
